



## Globally recognized


OSI is recognized by individuals, companies, and by public institutions from all over the world as **the authority** that defines Open Source.

## Neutral partner


OSI represents equally the interests of all Open Source projects, allowing us to participate in complex policy discussions **without prejudice**.

## License and Legal



Monitoring policy and standards setting organizations. Supporting legislators and policy makers educating them about the Open Source ecosystem, its role in innovation and its value for an open future.


## Advocacy & Outreach

This article is part of Shop Talk, a regular feature that explores the idiosyncrasies of the business world: the insider jargon, the newly coined terms, the unfortunate or overused phrases.

There's a big debate in the tech world over whether artificial intelligence models should be "open source." Tim Mink, who helped found OpenAI in 2015, [said the startup](#) and its chief executive, Sam Altman, on claims that the company had diverged from its mission of openness. The Biden administration is investigating the risks and benefits of open source models.

Proponents of open source A.I. models say they're more equitable and safer for society, while detractors say they are more likely to be abused for malicious intent. One big hiccup in the debate? There's no agreed-upon definition of what open source A.I. actually means. And some are accusing A.I. companies of "openwashing" — using the "open source" term disingenuously to make themselves look good. (Accusations of openwashing have previously been aimed at coding projects that used the open source label too loosely.)

In a blog post on Open Future, a European think tank supporting open sourcing, [Aleks Tarkowski wrote](#), "As the rules get written, one challenge is building sufficient guardrails against corporations' attempts at 'openwashing.'" Last month the Linux Foundation, a nonprofit that supports open-source software projects, cautioned that "this 'openwashing' trend threatens to undermine the very premise of openness — the free sharing of knowledge to enable inspection, replication and collective advancement."



Meta has been criticised for calling its artificial intelligence models "open-source" by the group that has spearheaded open-source technology in the software world for the past 25 years.


The social media company is "confusing" users and "polluting" the term open-source by using it to describe its Llama family of large language models, said Stefano Maffulli, head of the Open Source Initiative. The body coined the term open-source in the late 1990s and has been seen as the guardian of the concept since.
